Dr. Sandra Kirby is Professor and Chair of the Department of Sociology at The University of Winnipeg. She is a former Olympic rower and is now a coach at the Prairie Fire Rowing Club. Her recent sport research has been focused on sexual harassment and abuse of athletes and on hazing and initiation in sport. Her research into systemic discrimination led to the development of policies against discrimination, sexual harassment, and abuse that are currently employed by major national sport organizations today.

He was also a founding member of the Manitoba Athletic Therapists Association and was the first President of the Sport Medicine Council of Manitoba.

Bergeron has a wealth of clinical skills and experiences at the university, professional, national, and international levels including his selection to the Canadian Medical Team for the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary, Chief Therapist for the 1990 Western Canada Summer Games, the 1992 Summer Olympics in Barcelona, the 1995 World Cross Country Running Championships in Durham England and the Chief Therapist for the 1995 World University Games in Japan.
