Honorary Degree and Award Recipients The University of Winnipeg 83rd Convocation, Sunday, June 3, 2007

Morning Convocation, 10:00 a.m. Degrees will be conferred in Education and Science

- Bob Bector, B.Sc., M.Sc. Instructor in Mathematics & Statistics, will be presented with the Clifford J. Robson Memorial Award for Excellence in Teaching. Bector is considered the "consummate professional" for presenting well-prepared and well-organized lectures, well-designed and extremely fair tests and providing excellent support to his students and his colleagues.
- Dr. Roger Kingsley, BA (Hons.), MA, PhD Assistant Professor in Mathematics & Statistics will be honoured with the Clarence Atchison Award for Excellence in Community Service. An active community member, Kingsley has devoted much of his volunteer time and service to Scouts Canada and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada on the local, provincial and national levels over the past 30 years. As Chair of Scout Canada's Audit Committee, Kingsley helped restore the fiscal health of the organization. As well, he served as a board member of the Interfaith Marriage and Family Institute (now Aurora) giving of his skills and commitment to the governance of the Institute.
- Joyce Milgaard will receive an Honorary Doctor of Laws for her contributions as a role model, and her ability to overcome the tragedy of her son David Milgaard's wrongful conviction and accomplish a public-spirited pursuit of justice for the wrongfully convicted. Milgaard has been named to the *Maclean's* Magazine Honour Roll and was awarded the Canada 125 Anniversary Medal for "significant contribution to fellow citizens, their community or Canada." She remains involved with the John Howard Society and is regional director of the national organization the Association in Defense of the Wrongfully Convicted. She frequently speaks at schools and universities in Canada and the U.S. in defence of the wrongly convicted. She appears frequently on television on various community issues. She currently lives in Petersfield, MB where she works as a Christian Science practitioner, one who helps bring healing to others through prayer.

- Steven Schipper will be awarded an Honorary Doctor of Letters for his outstanding contribution to theatre and the arts in Manitoba. Schipper, a graduate of the National Theatre School, has had a long and distinguished career as a director in theatres across Canada. Since 1989, he has served as artistic director of the Manitoba Theatre Centre and has been credited with bringing financial stability and artistic success to MTC. His theatrical triumphs include world premieres including local writer Maureen Hunter's *Transit of Venus* (1992-93) and *Atlantis* (1995-96). In 1995, Schipper brought Hollywood actor Keanu Reeves to Winnipeg to play Hamlet, and has throughout his tenure cast extensively from the local acting community. Under his leadership, MTC has been called "the most successful regional theatre in the Canada," balancing artistic risks with classics and attracting an estimable list of theatre artists creating "an artistic renaissance."
- J.F. Reeh Taylor, QC, LLB will be admitted as a Fellow of The University of Winnipeg. Taylor, Senior Counsel with Taylor McCaffrey LLP, served as UWinnipeg's long-time legal counsel and has contributed greatly to The University of Winnipeg and general communities. A great supporter of the arts, Taylor was co-founder of Virtuosi Concerts Inc. and the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra, and has served on the board of Virtuosi Concerts for a decade. Taylor, was acknowledged by the Manitoba Bar Association with its Distinguished Service Award in 1993. Another achievement of Taylor's was founding the Canadian Association of University Solicitors where he served as its first president. He is described as "a true Renaissance man...a gentleman of distinction and culture...who has created for all of us a better place to live."

■ **Dr. Craig Cooper**, **BA** (**Hons.**), **MA**, **PhD** Associate Professor, Chair of Classics and Acting Chair of Philosophy, will be awarded the **Robin H. Farquhar Award for Excellence in Contributing to Self-Governance**. His exemplary work in the area of self-governance is demonstrated by his collegial, effective and dedicated service to more than 40 University and faculty committees including as Chair of the Faculty Council of Arts & Science nominating committee, President of the Faculty & Staff Club, Member and Chair of the Chairs' Caucus, Senator and Board of Regents member.

- James Eldridge, BA, MA will receive an Honorary Doctor of Laws in recognition of his dedication to Manitoba and Canada and for his tireless efforts to ensure harmonious relations between the federal and provincial governments. Eldridge's career in the Manitoba public service spans 37 years—serving under six premiers and creating the first department of intergovernmental affairs in 1982. Throughout his career, which included serving as Deputy Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs and as Clerk of the Executive Council, Eldridge has demonstrated commitment to the highest levels of integrity and professionalism. Eldridge retired in 2004 but continues to serve as an advisor on intergovernmental relations and as an advisor to the Manitoba Business Council.
- David Martin (BA '83) will receive the Distinguished Alumni Award for his work championing, advocating on behalf of and improving the lives of people with disabilities. Martin worked for the Manitoba League of Persons with Disabilities for 17 years. In addition to acting as a spokesperson during his time with the League, Martin was active in the development of many government policies and programs which support those with disabilities. For four years he continued that work at Ten Ten Sinclair Housing, Inc., an organization that helps disabled individuals make the transition to independent living. Since 2004, he has served as Executive Director of the Province of Manitoba's Disabilities Issues Office. His community involvement includes the Community Health Advisory Council for Seven Oaks/Inkster, the Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada, Equal Rights Advisory Committee, Court Challenges Program of Canada and Council of Canadians with Disabilities.
- Randall Moffat, (Collegiate '61), C.M., founding director of The University of Winnipeg Foundation will be awarded an Honorary Doctor of Laws for his inspiring philanthropy, his community involvement and his commitment to helping young people and the socially and economically disadvantaged members of our society. Former president of Moffat Communications, Moffat championed the advancement of women in the broadcasting industry through the Women's Television Network and its Foundation. Moffat gained national attention in 2001 when he and his family gave a \$100 million contribution to The Winnipeg Foundation to enrich the lives of children and their families.
- **Dr. Reginald Skene, BA, M.Ed., MA, PhD** will be admitted into **Fellowship in United College** for his vision and leadership in establishing The University of Winnipeg's Department of Theatre and Drama in 1982. Under Skene's guidance which including chairing the department and the committee which developed the present pre-professional program, the Department of Theatre & Drama flourished and gained respect as one of Canada's premiere theatre programs. Currently Senior Scholar at UWinnipeg, Skene retired in 2002 after nearly 40 years. During his career, Skene held leadership positions in The University of Winnipeg Faculty Association for 15 years and also sustained a multi-faceted professional career as a productive scholar, writer, reviewer and director.

• Dr. Mary Young, BA, PBCE, M.Ed., PhD, Director of the Aboriginal Students Services Centre, will receive the Marsha Hanen Award for Excellence in Creating Community Awareness. Young has served as a voice for Aboriginal peoples and education at The University of Winnipeg and in the community. The issues she addresses range from healing the residential school experience, combating racism and discrimination, incorporating the wisdom of Elders into modern society and ensuring the survival of Aboriginal languages. She has worked diligently to reconnect many Aboriginal young people with their home communities, culture and languages.
