Backgrounder on Margaret Sweatman

Winnipeg-born novelist and playwright Margaret Sweatman (Collegiate '71, BA '74) is an award-winning author who also works creatively in poetry, song, and performance. Sweatman's most recent novel, *When Alice Lay Down With Peter* (2001), is the winner of numerous fiction awards including the Carol Shields Winnipeg Book Award, the Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize, the Margaret Laurence Award for Fiction, and the McNally Robinson Book of the Year Award. Sweatman is also the author of *Sam and Angie*, and *Fox* for which she won both the McNally Robinson Prize for the Manitoba Book of the Year and the John Hirsch Award for the most promising Manitoba writer. Sweatman began her fourmonth term in January, 2006 as **The University of Winnipeg's first Carol Shields Writer-in-Residence**.

The Carol Shields Writer-in-Residence Program was launched with a \$100,000 gift from Don Shields in honour of Carol, Pulitzer Prize-winning author and former Chancellor of The University of Winnipeg. It brings an established writer to The University of Winnipeg to mentor students and community writers. Sweatman reads and responds to manuscripts, holds regular office hours for students and the public, organizes reading series, public readings, seminars or lectures on writing, and devotes time to her own creative works.

The UWinnipeg Writer-in-Residence service is free, open to the public, and runs until April 2006. Writers may drop off their manuscripts (to a maximum of 20 pages) at The University of Winnipeg Deans' Office, 3C16 (3rd Floor, Centennial Hall).
